Student ID Numbers

Common Student ID Opt-in Process

(Washington State Community and Technical Colleges only)

Beginning Winter Quarter 2012, upon admission - a college, students may opt - have the same student ID assigned that was assigned at a previously attended college when they provide a correct social security number. This common SID process only affects students who apply - colleges as of 12/16/2011. It does not apply - previously applied or attended colleges within the Washington State Community and Technical college system.

Internal Revenue Service Treasury Regulation

TO COMPLY WITH FEDERAL LAWS, we are required to ask for your Social Security number (SSN) or individual taxpayer identification number (ITIN). We will use your SSN/ITIN to report Hope Scholarship/Life Time tax credit, to administer state/federal financial aid, to verify enrollment, degree and academic transcript records, and to conduct institutional research. If you do not submit your SSN/ITIN, you will not be denied access to the college; however, you may be subject to civil penalties (refer to Internal Revenue Service Treasury Regulation 1.6050S-1(e)(4) for more information). Pursuant to state law (RCW 28B.10.042) and federal law (Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act), the college will protect your SSN from unauthorized use and/or disclosure.

New Student/Transfer Student/Returning Student Advising

- **New SVC degree seeking students:** You are required to attend an advising session before they can register at SVC. This requirement can be fulfilled by attending a group advising session, completing the new student online advising module, or meet with a counselor or advisor in person. Skagit Valley College has implemented mandatory advising to make sure students are aware of graduation requirements, college resources, and opportunities.
- **Returning Students:** Returning SVC students (students who have not attended SVC for three years) are strongly recommended to see a counselor before registering for classes.
- **Transfer Students:** Students who have attended another institution and are transferring to SVC are required to meet with a counselor before registering for classes.

Worker Retraining

Worker Retraining is a state-funded program that provides job-related training and employment services to dislocated and unemployed workers to help them gain additional training in their existing field or get started on a new career path.

Students in the Worker Retraining Program have diverse backgrounds, education levels, and types of work experience. You may be eligible for Worker Retraining if you:

- Have been laid off or have received a layoff notice from a WA state employer AND
- Are currently receiving or are eligible to receive Washington state unemployment benefits; OR
- Have exhausted Washington state employment benefits within the past 24 months.
- Need to upgrade your skills to remain employed

Training offerings include short-term certificates and up to two-year technical degree programs. Because the emphasis in the Worker Retraining Program is retraining and rapid reemployment, programs designed for transfer to a four-year college or university are not approved. SVC Worker Retraining Financial Aid provides funding for tuition and books for approved programs. The SVC Worker Retraining Program works closely with WA State Employment Security, Northwest Workforce Development Council and Work Source. Approval from Employment Security (Commissioner Approved Training) is required to enroll in a training program while drawing unemployment benefits.

Online Registration

1. Visit our web site, www.skagit.edu
2. Click on MySVC.
3. Click on Register Online.
4. Enter your login information
 - » Student Identification Number (SID).
 - » Personal Identification Number (PIN).
This is usually your birth date in MM/DD/YY format.
 - » Quarter you wish to register for from the drop-down menu.
5. Click **Enter Registration**.
6. Read the Welcome Page info and click **Continue**.

Using the Registration Screen to Add a Class

In an open box on the left-hand frame, enter the line number for each course you have selected. You may enter up to five classes at one time. Prerequisites must be added at the same time. After entering each number, click **Submit Add/Drop**.

To Add a Class with an Entry Code

- » You must first obtain the code from the instructor or department chair.
- » Enter the course line number and click **Submit Add/Drop**.
- » A message will display informing you that an entry code is required for the course you have selected. In the open box, enter the correct entry code. Click **Submit Entry Code**.

To Add a Variable Credit Course

To register for a variable-credit course, register first for that course before adding others, as the system will enroll you in the maximum number of credits available for the course. You may adjust the credits after you have registered for it.

- » Enter the course line number and click **Submit Add/Drop**.
- » Click **Change Credits**.
- » In the box displaying the current number of credits assigned to the course, enter the number of credits you need. Click **OK** to accept the change.

To Drop a Class

- » Enter the line number. Click **Submit Add/Drop**.
- » A message will display that you are about to drop a course. Click **OK** to confirm or **Cancel** to remain enrolled in the course.

To Complete Registration

- » Click **Finish**.

Waitlist

REMEMBER: When you are on a waitlist and an opening occurs, you will be automatically registered for the course. **Check the waitlist daily to avoid unwanted debt.** To check your position, see if you have been enrolled in a class from the waitlist, or if you have been removed from the waitlist go to www.skagit.edu, click the MySVC link, then under **Student Toolbox** (left column), click **Registration Tools**, then **Check/Drop Waitlists**.

- **NOTE:** It is your responsibility to monitor your movement on the waitlist. You will be charged for all classes in which you are enrolled from the electronic waitlist.

In-Person Registration

All new and Non-Degree-Seeking students can register in-person at the Registration Office at any campus or center. The following students must register in-person or with advisor assistance:

Student Eligibility to Pay Resident Tuition

House Bill 1079 which took effect July 1, 2003 allows people who are not documented as citizens to attend college paying in-state tuition. Eligibility: People who have resided in Washington state for the three years immediately prior to receiving a high school diploma and completed the full senior year at a Washington High School or who have completed the equivalent of a high school diploma and resided in Washington state for the three years immediately before receiving the equivalent of the diploma and who have continuously resided in the state since earning the high school diploma or its equivalent.

Time of Degree Completion

Pursuant to E2SSB 5135, Skagit Valley College has developed policies to ensure enrolled undergraduates complete degree and certificate programs in a timely manner. These policies address: (a) Students who accumulate more than one hundred twenty-five percent of the number of credits required to complete their respective associate degree or certificate programs; (b) Students who drop more than twenty-five percent of their course load before the grading period for the quarter or semester, which prevents efficient use of instructional resources; and (c) Students who remain on academic probation for more than one quarter or semester.

We are an AVID Post-Secondary Institution

Skagit Valley College embraces Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID) learning strategies. AVID provides our students with proven methods for being successful in college classes. These learning practices focus on writing, inquiry, critical thinking and reading. Many faculty have adapted these learning tools to successfully teach their subject area. AVID practices are used in all Skagit County school districts and are familiar to many of our incoming students. SVC wishes to continue the good classroom practices started in K-12 that support student achievement and performance in college level classes. It is our hope that by using these strategies in our classrooms and supporting students to use them in their college learning, that all students will be successful in completing their college goals at Skagit Valley College and beyond.

* Fees:

General Fee—\$2 per credit up to a maximum of \$34.00 per quarter. In exchange for paying this fee students receive placement testing as they enter the college, unlimited transcript requests prior to and after graduation, graduation regalia and diplomas, a yearly parking permit decal (MV campus) and parking maintenance of the district's owned parking lots at Mount Vernon, Whidbey Island and San Juan Island.

Student Technology Fee—\$5 per credit up to a maximum of \$40 per quarter. This is a student-controlled fee that pays for student-use technology such as computers and staffing for general computer labs, student e-mail, and other emerging technology enhancements.

ASSVC Self Assessed Building Fee—\$1.50 per credit up to a maximum of \$15 per quarter. Funds collected from this fee pay for student facilities at the college including the newly remodeled Campus Center building on the Mount Vernon Campus and improvements to student facilities on the Whidbey Island Campus and South Whidbey and San Juan centers.

E-Learning Fee—\$22.00 per E-Learning and/or hybrid course up to a maximum of \$44 per quarter. This fee subsidizes the cost of the software licenses necessary to offer courses in online formats. It also pays for the cost of on-ground, online, and telephone support for E-Learning students.

VETERAN'S WAIVER

Add/Drop & Attendance Policies

Attendance

Students are expected to attend all classes in which they are registered, as evaluation of progress in any course is cumulative and based on class assignments, participation and examinations.

Course Drops

- ▶ **Up to the 3rd day of the quarter**, students may withdraw from a class via Web Registration or submit an Add/Drop form to the Registration Office.
- ▶ **Failure to attend** a class does not constitute a course drop. *Students who do not officially withdraw will be assessed full tuition fees, and refunds will not be made.* Requests for late drops will not be granted simply because the student was unaware of the policies, or failed to submit a drop form.
- ▶ **Courses dropped before the 10th instructional day** of the quarter will not be posted to the permanent student record.
- ▶ **Courses dropped after the 10th instructional day** will be annotated "W" on the permanent student record.
- ▶ **Courses may be dropped any time before close of business** on December 7, 2012. The only exception is that all courses of enrollment may be dropped by the last day of the quarter, Friday, December 14.

Course Adds

Until the 3rd day of the quarter, students may add courses via Web Registration or submit an Add/Drop form to the Registration Office according to space availability. After the third day, students must submit an Add/Drop form to the Registrar's Office.

After the 3rd day of the quarter, course adds will be made only with the instructor's signature, and in consideration of the wait list, if any. A course Add/Drop form must be submitted to the Registrar's Office.

Complaint Process

E-Learning at SVC

SVC offers students a variety of E-Learning resources on campus and off. Here are some ways education can come to you:

- **Hybrid Courses:** Coursework is done partially online and partially at an SVC campus and the online portion is required.

What support is available for E-Learning?

Skagit Valley College intends to provide a drug-free healthful, safe and secure environment. SVC recognizes that its efforts are limited to the following:

1. The effects of drug and alcohol abuse on a student's academic ability and behavior while involved in college activities;
2. The effects of drug and alcohol abuse on an employee's job performance and on-the-job behavior. There will be no intrusion upon the private life of any student or employee.

I. RELEVANT STATE/LOCAL LAWS & COLLEGE POLICIES

Both the State of Washington and Skagit Valley College have adopted laws and policies governing the use of alcohol and controlled substances. The following is a summary listing of some of the laws and policies most relevant to SVC students and employees:

A. Student Use/Abuse Of Alcohol And Controlled Substances: Students are prohibited from using, possessing, being demonstrably under the influence of, or selling, any narcotic or controlled substance, except when the use or possession of a drug is specifically prescribed as medication by an authorized medical doctor or dentist. Students are further prohibited from being demonstrably under the influence of any form of alcoholic beverage or possessing or consuming any form of alcoholic beverage on college

property, with the exception of sanctioned events approved by the president or a designee and in compliance with state law. These prohibitions apply to every student whenever said student is present upon or in any college facility and whenever said student is present at or engaged in any college-sponsored activity which is held on or in non-college facilities. [WAC 132D-120-1-030 (1) and 050 (3) (f) and (g)]

B. Employees are prohibited from being under the influence of or participating in the unlawful manufacture, distribution, possession or use of a controlled substance in and on college-owned or controlled property, or while conducting college business. In addition, intoxicating beverages are not permitted in or around the work site, and employees under the influence of alcohol are not permitted on the work site. (WAC 296-024-073)

II. ASSISTANCE

The college recognizes its obligation to promote the health, safety and well-being of its students and employees and to encourage appropriate assistance.

A. Student Assistance: Students are encouraged to voluntarily seek expert assistance for alcoholism or drug dependency. Students who voluntarily reveal to a college staff member that they have been or are currently involved in the abuse of alcohol or illicit drugs shall have the confidentiality and anonymity of their communication respected and limited to referral to the SVC Counseling Center. Any student receiving approved professional treatment for an alcohol or drug problem will be considered for emergency medical leave for the purpose of tuition refund according to SVC policy. Students will use their own resources to cover costs incurred for treatment.

B. Employee Assistance: Employees of SVC are encouraged to seek help voluntarily when aware that their use of alcohol or illicit drugs, or any related personal problem, is affecting their job performance. Assistance is available through the College Employee Assistance Program.

Administrators of SVC may refer employees to the State Employees Advising Service when job performance deteriorates to an unacceptable level and normal corrective action has not been effective or when an employee abuses alcohol or illicit drugs.

III. SANCTIONS

A. SVC will impose sanctions on students and employees consistent with local, state and federal laws. These sanctions include possible expulsion or termination of students or employees who violate these laws. [WAC 132D-120-050 (2)]

IV. HEALTH RISKS

The following are some of the health risks that have been associated with the use or abuse of alcohol or controlled substances:

A. Alcohol: Use of alcohol, especially over the long term, can result in skin diseases, cancer of the throat, gastritis, pancreatitis, permanent nerve damage, high blood pressure, stroke, heart diseases, enlarged and other liver damage, loss of energy and malnutrition. Alcohol also can kill brain cells, which do not have the ability to regenerate themselves. This can result in irreversible brain damage.

B. Marijuana: Use of marijuana affects the brain by inhibiting short-term memory, slowing reaction time and impairing visual tracking (the ability to follow moving objects accurately). Frequent use is also linked to cognitive impairment (an inability to abstract and understand concepts). Marijuana speeds a user's heartbeat as much as 50 percent while high, an increased risk for anyone with heart disease. Frequent use affects reproduction and is linked to a decreased sperm count and sperm movement (motility) in men and irregular ovulation and menstrual cycles in women. THC, an active ingredient in marijuana, also travels through the placenta and has caused complications during pregnancy.

C. Cocaine: Chronic use can produce cocaine dependency, behavior change and weight loss. Cocaine also interferes with sleep, causing moodiness and irritability. Chemically, chronic cocaine use can lower the threshold for brain seizures and alter the brain's pleasure centers so that the user may need it just to feel normal. Those who smoke crack can also suffer sore throats and lung damage.

D. Amphetamines (Speed): Use of amphetamines or diet pills may cause teeth grinding, sleeplessness, weight loss, sores and nonhealing ulcers, liver disease, hypertensive disorders, cerebral hemorrhage (stroke) and kidney damage. Methamphetamine is capable of producing direct injury to arteries and veins, which can cause severe brain damage. A rebound effect, after long-term use, is characterized by general lethargy and depression of mood and physiological function.

E. Barbiturates (Downers): Use of barbiturates can depress the activity of the nerves, skeletal muscle, smooth muscle and cardiac muscle. Barbiturate use can cause liver damage with long-term use to hypersensitive persons. Depressed breathing and blood pressure, amnesia, coma and brain damage can result from its use. Barbiturates can also cause adverse drug interactions and hormone imbalances. Loss of REM sleep, which can result in reduction of essential well-being, results from barbiturate use.
